Work can be submitted under the categories of Articles, Critical Discussions, Book Reviews, Responses to Articles, and Student Contributions. Along with the change in Paideusis's "look", there has been a change in editorship. I must thank John Portelli for the work he put into Paideusis during his term as editor for volumes 10 thru 12.
